

Congratulations to the LAPRAF 2025 Scholarship Winners!

Meet the winners of the Los Angeles Police Relief and Assistance Foundation (LAPRAF) scholarship program. Seven winners of the \$10,000 college scholarships were chosen from a pool of 70 applicants based on their academic excellence, leadership and dedication to community service. Each student will receive \$2,500 annually for four years.

Grant is a graduate of Grace
High School and plans to study
biomedical engineering at
Rice University. Fascinated
by the ability of machinery to
compensate for debilitating
injuries, Grant designed a
foot orthosis for people living
with cerebral palsy to correct
movement habits in his design

and modeling class. Through an Apple Engineering internship, he also helped develop a "smart" dumbbell prototype for people with exercise disabilities.

He also completed a NASA STEM Enhancement & Earth Science internship and was a pit crew member on the only teen team competing in professional Pro-2 racing. He was the sole perfect-score applicant selected for the Chicano Youth Leadership Project statewide leadership conference. In addition, Grant worked with disadvantaged kids through For the Need Foundation. A proficient musician, he plays multiple instruments.

With the goal of working in prosthetics, Grant chose Rice University for its cutting-edge science and engineering programs and emphasis on interdisciplinary studies.

LAPRA 2024 Annual Report

U.S. stocks achieved another positive year in 2024 driven by the FED lowering interest rates and continued positive earnings of U.S. companies. The S&P 500 posted a gain of more than 20% for the second year in a row, which is the first time this has occurred since the late 1990s. The Magnificent Seven stocks (Mag 7), Amazon, Apple, Tesla, Nvidia, etc., were the primary drivers of the market's overall return (i.e., Nvidia, returned 171% in 2024). The performance of the Mag 7 stocks was also the primary reason growth stocks again outperformed value stocks. Although Mag 7 stocks did represent an outsized contribution to the return of the S&P 500 (the S&P 500 is used as a general proxy for the stock market), there were other individual stocks that contributed to the overall return. For example, Vistra, a utility company, was positive 258% and United Airlines was up 135% compared to Nvidia's return of 171%. The Fed lowered interest rates three times in 2024 totaling a full percentage point in September, November, and December. The reductions, which were the first since the COVID pandemic in March of 2020, came amid easing inflation and mixed readings from the job market.

The Association returned 8.8% in 2024 which was in line with expectations given its conservative asset allocation, i.e. 45% equities, 40% bonds,10% alternatives (real estate, private equity, etc.), and 5% to cash. The portfolio is constructed to protect capital demonstrated when markets were negative in 2022. The Association's asset allocation is reviewed annually to ensure it is in compliance with its investment policy. As of December 31, 2024, Association assets totaled \$98,774,774. ■
